
CONTINUITY OF MONITORING EVALUATION DURING THE COVID-19 **PANDEMIC**

INTRODUCTION



Key questions to assess M&E continuation

- Is the project/activity/initiative on-going despite the current restrictions? and if so, how does this affect M&E activities of the project/program?
- 2. Do M&E activities need adjustments? (what are the compliance issues)?
- 3. What are the risks and implications of any changes to M&E activities; Are there any ethical considerations too?
- 4. Have you consulted, engaged with and informed stakeholders including the donor(s)?
- 5. What kinds of resources are needed?

Data Collection Alternatives

- 1. Replacing Field visits with virtual information collection
- 2. Online modalities for surveys, interviews and focus groups
- Prioritize document collection and interviews

Monitoring systems should be strengthened through exercises such as:

- Data quality assessment,
- Remote Monitoring and;
- Third-party Monitoring.

Summary

- M&E during COVID-19 must be context specific, flexible, and adaptable to projects.
- Without M&E data, we would lack essential information to plan, manage, learn, and adapt throughout the Program Cycle. Suspending or eliminating M&E would make it harder to ensure accountability and evidence-based decision making.
- As M&E professionals, even though movement is hindered by travel and social distancing requirements, we need to put in place systems that ensure the continuity of M&E during covid-19 pandemic while weighing M&E efforts against the risks and observing the laid down government protocols.
